The big day arrived-good weather, good crowd, good auctioneer, good food but poor prices!!! Alison was very distressed that night for lan and **James** 



but lan said next morning 'Just think of all the people who have woken up excited about the treasures they have bought! ever positive. Finally, weeks later it was all over. Mixed emotions of relief, sadness, thankfulness for a good life and deep appreciation of James' help that made the Sale possible. Time for a break; we flew Melb -Darwin - Katherine (car) -Darwin- Cairns - Weipa - home. Always special to see the family up north. Debbie, Steph, Olivia and Adam, Levi and Hannah. The NT has beautiful scenery. The special feature this visit was a helicopter ride over the Katherine Gorge. The Darwin War Museum and harbour tour by boat is a 'must see'. Cairns stay included a snorkel over the coral on the outer reef and lunch with Alison's niece, Sandi. Weipa in far north Queensland is unique. Oldest grandson, Bill and his wife, Steph welcomed us into their home. We gained a glimpse of their lifestyle by doing a tour of the bauxite mine. Bill drives a haul truck. It was an eye opener to see that only the top 3 or 4 meters is

While away Ian received a phone call from the Maryborough, QLD police station inquiring if we knew Elizabeth McEwen of Jeffcott Nth memory jumped back over 40 years - she had died. Alison was surprised how emotional she felt. Elizabeth was Neil's first wife and mother of lan's niece and nephew, Jason and Samantha. We had brought her into our family, and being part of our lives for a number of years were distressed when she decided to leave and over time drifted well away, having had no contact for over 12 years. The memorial service at Granite was a time of remembrance and healing. Being home for the winter was a change.
